



dvent is just around the corner, which means time to prepare for Christmas — the birth of Our Lord and savior Jesus Christ. The joy of Christmas depends on the intensity with which we live out the Season of Advent. Let us follow these concrete suggestions and live out this Season of Advent with great joy, prayer, love and intensity. Let us live out this Advent as if it were to be the last in our lives. Indeed, it could be! Jesus constantly reminds us to be alert, awake and to be ready and prepared for His coming because we know neither the day nor the hour.

Here are five helpful suggestions for making this your holiest Advent, yet!

1. Practice Silence

Remember the Prophet Elijah and his experience with God in the silence on the Mountain. (I Kings 19: 11- 13) Try to eliminate unnecessary noise in your life and find a few minutes for silence. Turn off the noise pollution for just a while. life.

2. Prayer

Find more time to pray in this Holy Season. The Church encourages us to increase and intensify our prayer life. Forms of prayer are many. The list might be among the following:

Liturgy of the Hours

Psalms — the prayer book of the Bible

Holy Hour and the Word of God

Lectio Divina and following the classical steps: lectio, meditacio, conteplacio, oracio, accio, and finally transformacio (Pope Benedict XVI, in his writings on the word of God, Verbum Domini, strongly recommends this)

Holy Mass — the prayer "par excellence"

Vocal prayers prayed slowly and with great attention and love

Examen of Conscience (strongly recommended by Saint Ignatius)

Holy Rosary — possibly the Scriptural Rosary

Contemplate the Crib/ the empty crib, the Shepherds

It could be very helpful to supplement your prayer, to read a good book on prayer; there are many, but find a good one!

3. Serve the Poor

Perhaps in this season of Advent you can find some way that you can serve Jesus in the poor. Remember that Jesus manifests Himself in the poor. Blessed Mother Teresa said that we should discover Jesus in the "distressing disguise of the poor." Read Mt 25:31-46—the Parable of the Last Judgment. Jesus points out that our final Judgment will be based on how we treat the poor. Never forget this challenge: charity begins at home!

4. Holy Mass in Advent

Try to go to Holy Mass every day in Advent. If you already attend daily Mass then go a step or two beyond what you are doing. Try to come earlier before Mass to prepare yourself better to receive Jesus into your "Bethlehem"—House of Bread, meaning your own heart. Also try to encourage and bring all the family members and friends that you can to encounter Jesus in the Eucharist. As St. Andrew brought people to Jesus, you are also called to bring people to Jesus, the Savior! Indeed Jesus is the pearl and treasure of infinite price. Share Him with others!

5. Imitate Our Lady

In the Marian classic written by Saint Louis de Montfort, True Devotion to Mary highlights Mary's ten most exalted virtues. They are: deep humility, lively faith, blind obedience, unceasing prayer, constant self-denial, surpassing purity, ardent love, heroic patience, angelic kindness, and heavenly wisdom. (True Devotion to Mary, # 108).

Why not choose one or two of these virtues of Mary, beg through her intercession the grace to imitate them and then during the course of Advent make a concerted effort to live these virtues out more fully in your life? Mary is the shortest, quickest, and the easiest path to arrive at the Heart of Jesus. I hope this finds you doing well in these COVID times. I am so proud and happy that we are able to have copies of our Parish newsletter in our hands once again. As you know, it has been a long while since we have had one and we are blest in having a great staff to prepare it.

These last months have been an incredible challenge to everyone... no one excluded. It has caused absolute havoc with the timing on our community's Parish Activity Center (PAC) project and renovations of the old church/Parish hall. Following all the steps prescribed by the archdiocese has been a test, but one that we persistently address. To refresh everyone's memory, right before COVID hit us this past March, we had been approved by the archbishop to move forward on the next steps of our plan. The Steering Committee has continued to meet throughout all this time as have JRA Architects and Wehr Contractors. We are getting a clearer picture before us of what we can afford and what other needs we have yet to meet. \$1,156,816.00 which represents 85% of our goal in 29 months. **That is super!** Thank you! In time, you will also be invited to financially participate in other items needed *in* our new building, too. As always, I invite, encourage and welcome our *new* members to please help by making a financial commitment to the Parish for the **PAC** as well as the improvements in the old church. Taking ownership in our communal work and effort is an opportunity that fulfills the mission of Jesus and our Parish, **His** Parish. Won't you *please* help?

Lastly, I offer a word of most sincere thanks to **all** who worked (seen and unseen) so hard on our *first-ever* AuctionFest. What an incredible achievement during these days of COVID and all the unknowns that have come with that virus. Working together we can do great things! God bless each of you!

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On October 10th, Deacon David Maxwell and I were fortunate to lead a small group of faithful Catholics in a Public Square Rosary Rally at St. Gabriel Parish. This was part of a Rosary Crusade organized by "America Needs Fatima" Rosary Crusade. The event occurred in over 21,000 locations across America that day. Thanks to those of you who attended the rally!

The Rosary Rally intention was to ask God for His mercy and plead for Our Lady to intercede for us to help save America from today's chaos, immorality and social upheaval.

America seems to be at historical crossroads with the unknowns of the Coronavirus pandemic and recent civil unrest. There is no doubt our nation is in great need of prayer as we combat abortion, euthanasia, homelessness, human trafficking and other threats to religious liberty and freedom and to human dignity. Unfortunately, this war between good and evil has always been waged in the world and it's waged within each of us and our families as well. At times we lack hope that we can make a difference in our world. There is one place, though, we can make a difference and it's within our families.

Venerable Father Patrick Peyton, C.S.C says that "The family that prays together

stays together," and the Holy Rosary provides this opportunity to our families. Praying the Rosary together as a family each night can create a strong foundation for one's faith. Meditation on the salvific mysteries of Christ, together in union with Mary and as a family, can unite us as one. The fruits of the mysteries like humility, poverty of spirit, obedience and love of neighbor are part of what can actually make us grow in virtue and holiness. Pride, jealousy and anger are among those things that easily slip into our daily lives and weigh upon our hearts. Yet, Our Lord is ever-present and ever-ready to bring us healing of mind, body and soul.

We understand the power that prayer can have in our personal lives, but sometimes prayer can be difficult in the family environment. How can we change this situation to make it a truly positive environment for the whole family? We can make it possible with the following faith steps:

Consider incorporating prayer through-out the day and not just at mealtimes. Consider saying a short prayer together in the morning before everyone heads off to their activities.

Consider adding individual prayers and intentions to the prayers before family meals.

Consider reciting an Our Father, a Hail Mary and a Glory Be in the car on the way to school or at home before starting non-traditional education each day.

Consider creating a prayerful environment in your home by defining a "prayer place"

with simple pieces of sacred art, a rosary, a crucifix or a bible. This can generate quiet time and family discussion as well.

Consider spending prayer time together as a family at a local

Make Rosaries as a family for your use together or to give as a gift to someone else. There are many ways to cultivate prayer in your home, but one thing is for sure, as you draw your family closer to Mary, she will draw your family closer to her Son.

In closing, I offer this "Prayer for Peace in Our Family" taken from the Laudate website: *Lord Jesus, be with my family.*

Grant us Your peace and harmony, an end to conflict and division.

Gift us with compassion to better understand each other, wisdom and love to assist each other, and trust and patience to live peacefully together.

Grant that through the intercession of your mother, Mary, and St. Joseph, our family may become a holy family accepting each other, working together in unity, selflessly dedicated to one another and to You.

In keeping with my past articles, the next ministry I want to highlight is the Garden Ministry. Located on our campus next to the maintenance garage, this is a wonderful example of stewardship of God's creation. How wonderful that this Parish makes use of a plot of land to raise vegetables for the hungry of the community!

From spring to fall the produce from the garden is taken to the Mt Washington Community Ministries and distributed to those families in need of food. That alone makes this a noteworthy project. But what really makes it outstanding is the number of volunteers and the dedication they have to planting and tending to this garden each year.

According to Sandee Clark, chairperson of the garden committee, there are about 9 Parishioners who dedicate themselves to maintaining the garden. Every spring, they prepare the ground and plant the seeds. This past spring, they planted tomatoes, cucumbers, squash, zucchini, cabbage, peppers, kale, green beans, sweet potatoes, broccoli and cauliflower. Late summer brought second plantings of green beans, kale, cabbage and broccoli for a fall harvest. Only organic fertilizer and natural neem oil as a pest repellent are used, ensuring safe and healthy produce.

Over the span of the growing season, one could find the "Garden Gang" weeding and watering the crops early Wednesday mornings. They gathered produce in 5 gallon buckets and took the fruits of their labors to the Mt. Washington Community Ministries for distribution. The average yield was 3-5 buckets of produce weekly for the season April to October.

This ministry always reminds me of the Eucharist. In the Eucharistic prayer, Father refers to the wine and bread as fruit of the vine and work of human hands. That is what our Garden Ministry is all about: working with human hands to reap the fruit of their plantings. In addition, the word Eucharist means "thanksgiving." Not only are the recipients of this food thankful for receiving it but we are thankful for the garden committee in their efforts to feed the hungry. Kudos to this group as they respond to Jesus' call to "Feed my sheep."



Dillan presented his final report on the
completion of the prayer garden to the Boy
Scout Council Board on October 13, 2020.
With their approval, Dillan was awarded the
rank of Eagle Scout. In his comments at the
blessing of the garden Dillan said he wanted to
provide a quiet place for SFX Parishioners or
