Calling upon Holy Mary

Every day we look at recent news, we are confronted with both the sadness and the bewilderment of the headlines coming from the crisis in Ukraine. It is very difficult

to observe the destruction and the loss of innocent lives across the land of a sovereign nation wrought by its aggressive neighbor, Russia. Beyond the horrendous sights, we are also concerned about the consequences this crisis may have upon the world, and how it may destabilize that region of the world for years to come. Recently there have been threats of the use of nuclear weapons. One can only hope and pray that those in power will exhaust all means of peaceful negotiations to resolve this conflict soon and to seek the common good of the people.

By viewing disturbing news like this every day, it seems one could develop some level of tolerance for conflict and death as a result of war. But looking beyond these scenes, do we realize that people are being displaced from their homes, that families are being separated, and that people are migrating without the necessities of life? Whenever I think of those who are suffering in this conflict, it causes me to pause and be thankful for my home, a warm place to rest, and food to eat. It saddens me that during our wars and conflict, the women,

children and the elderly carry the brunt of the suffering.

What can we do? First and foremost, prayer is always an answer. Prayer can lead us to greater acts of charity. Each person may consider what that response will be. May our voices cry out for an end to the conflict and join the voice of our Holy Father. On March 25 at St. Peter's Basilica, Pope Francis pronounced the Act of Consecration for the world and, in particular, Ukraine and Russia to the Immaculate Heart of Mary during a Lenten prayer service. His hope and prayer were that peace would reign in the world as he laid the fate of both countries at the feet of Mary. Bishops from all around the world announced special services that coincided with the timing of the consecration in Rome.

Our cries and prayers for peace are sent to the one who comes to our aid—our mother, the Queen of Peace, Mary the Mother of God. She is the one who can help bring peace to the world, in the name of her son Jesus. She is already working on this conflict by the prayers of so many from around the world. May she lead us to

We ask your maternal care for our Holy Father who works to reconcile the nations in peace. We seek your guidance for our President and other leaders as they strive for world peace.

Glorious Queen of peace, grant us peace in our hearts, harmony in our families and concord throughout the world. Immaculate Mother, as patroness of our beloved country, watch over us and protect us with your motherly love. Amen.




40th Jubilee

Father Dale Celebrates Milestone



Forty Years And Counting

On May 22, Father Dale Cieslik, with family, the St. Francis Xavier Faith Family and special guests in attendance, celebrated 40 years of priesthood. How fitting that this jubilee celebration was the first event held in our new Xavier Center, the cornerstone of the current long-range plan Father Dale has overseen these past several years. It has been a long, faith-filled journey, from May 22, 1982 when Archbishop Thomas Kelly ordained 27-year-old Dale Cieslik, to exactly 40 years later as pastor of St. Francis Xavier Church.

Father Dale knew from an early age he wanted to be a priest. After graduation from Southern High School in 1973, he spent one semester at Bellarmine University and

then attended St. Meinrad College where he graduated with a BA in history in 1978 and a Master of Divinity in 1982. He has served several Parishes in the Archdiocese including St. Leo the Great, St. Rita, St. Francis of Assisi, St. Pius X, St. Leonard, St. Elizabeth Ann Seton, All Saints and our own St. Francis Xavier since 2012. Father Dale has also served as a high school chaplain, Chancellor for the Archdiocese for many years as well as Archivist during which time he established the Archdiocesan History Center in the old St. Vincent DePaul church. He is currently the Historian for the Archdiocese and chaplain of the Bellarmine


"I have been so honored to have served," he said adding he has learned over the years that his priesthood "is a gift, not a reward or a right or an entitlement."

Women's Club Rolls For Fundraiser



The archbishop noted in his homily that when Jesus ascended, he did not leave us, but rather he blazed a trail that we could follow.

The Xavier Center represents a legacy to all who follow from those living and dead who made immense sacrifices to bring this dream to fruition.

After Mass, the congregation followed Archbishop Fabre and Father Dale around the parking lot to the entrance. A brief recounting of events that led to this moment were provided by Father Dale and a ribbon cutting followed. With great anticipation, the congregation flooded into the Xavier Center to see our new family home.

After welcoming remarks by Father Dale, the Archbishop prepared those gathered for the blessing. This included readings from St. Paul to the Ephesians that the Xavier Center is our new home and that Jesus Christ is the capstone and from Paul's letter to the Romans that reminds us that while we are many parts, we are one body in Christ. Mitchell Elder, the chairperson of the SFX Steering Committee, spoke about the importance of time, talent, and treasure to the ultimate success



of the Xavier Center project. Lou Leppert, Pastoral Council Chairperson, presented a plaque to Father Dale in recognition of his hard work in the creation of the Xavier Center.
