Celebrating The Archangels Feast Day: September 29

↑ ccording to the Church, there are seven Archangels based on what is known from Scripture and other Jewish and Christian sources Athroughout the centuries. Angels are mentioned numerous times in the Bible, most famously at the birth of Christ, ministering to Jesus in his temptation by the devil and his agony in the garden as well as in Tobit 12:15, Revelation 1:4, 20; 3:1; 8:2, 6; and Isaiah 63:9. Archangels are mentioned only twice (1 Thessalonians 4:16 and The Letter of Jude verse 9) in Scripture. Some of the Archangels are familiar while others are nearly unknown.

Officially, the Catholic Church acknowledges three of the seven Archangels, St. Michael, St. Gabriel and St. Raphael because these are the only angels named in Scripture. However, the Church also acknowledges that there are another four Archangels whose names appear in Jewish and Christian Apocryphal (a story of doubtful authenticity widely circulated as truth) Sources outside of the canon of Sacred Scripture. These Archangels are Uriel, Raguel,

Zerachiel and Remiel; note each angel's name ends in EL which means God.

St. Michael is mentioned in Sacred Scripture (Daniel 10:13, 10:21, and 12:1; the Letter of Jude verse 9 and Revelation 12:7) as well as in apocryphal Jewish and Christian writings. He is arguably the most wellknown Archangel and, as various traditions hold, is believed to be the first angel created. Michael's name means, "Who is like God?" and he is revered as the Guardian Angel of the Church. Famously, Michael is known as the angel who led the forces of heaven to cast out Lucifer (Satan) when he rebelled against God

St. Gabriel is God's holy messenger and is traditionally revered as the Archangel of Wisdom, Revelation, Prophesy and Visions. There are several variations of the meaning of Gabriel's name but it is often interpreted as "Strength of God." As a messenger of God, Sacred Scripture records that Gabriel appeared to the Prophet Daniel (Daniel 8), to Zechariah, the father of John the Baptist (Luke 1) and to the Virgin Mary at the Annunciation (Luke 1). According to tradition, Gabriel may have been the angel who appeared to Joseph in his dreams (Matthew 1 & 2) and that he was the guardian angel of Jesus and the holy family.

St. Raphael plays an important role in the Book of Tobit and this is the only time he is mentioned by name in the Bible. He is considered the Archangel of healing as his name means "Healing Power of God."

Uriel is traditionally considered the Archangel of Repentance and his name means "Fire of God." Though Uriel cannot be found in Scripture he was revered in the early centuries of the Church until the Council of Rome in 745 which removed four Archangels from the list of those worthy of veneration leaving only the three mentioned by name in Scripture. However, the Eastern Orthodox Church and the Anglican Church still venerate the Archangel Uriel.

These last three Archangels are revered by Christians in the East even though there are several variations of their names and how they are spelled. These Archangels are found only in apocryphal sources. Raguel (Sealtiel) whose name means "Friend of God" and traditionally revered as the Archangel of Justice and Fairness.

He is one of the main angels. His name is a

battle cry; both shield and weapon in the struggle against the enemy.

He is the friend of the walkers, doctor of the sick both physically and spiritually.



He had one of the most important missions: announcing to Virgin Mary that she would be the Mother of the Messigh.

Zerachiel (also known as Saraqael, Barachiel or Sariel) is traditionally considered the Archangel of God's Judgement and his name means "God's Command." Remiel (aka Jerahmeel, Jehudiel, or Jeremiel) is traditionally revered as the Archangel of Hope and Faith. The meaning of his name has several variations including, "Compassion of God", "Mercy of God" and "Thunder of God."

St. Michael, St. Gabriel and St. Raphael come to our aid and intercede for us through prayer. With personal devotion, we can each request this intercession keeping in mind that the angels serve always to bring glory to God without ceasing. What a beautiful example for all of us!
