I write of this because, as I come closer to retirement as a pastor, it seems that the eyes of my heart are more attuned to the hand of God's work in a most tender, pastoral way. I felt something similar the day after when celebrating the First Eucharist with 18 young children who came to the Lord's Table. To see parents fulfilling their marriage and baptismal commitments step up and "bring their child up in the practice of our faith" is no empty statement. To see the sacraments so interwoven in our daily living is what I had hoped priesthood would be. It has because God does not disappoint.

Recognizing the Voice of the Good Shepherd

In John's Gospel, Jesus tells us that He is the Good Shepherd. His sheep follow Him because they recognize His voice. He goes further to say that "I am the Good Shepherd, and I know mine and mine know me".

If we allow that statement to simmer within our souls, we begin to reflect and consider for ourselves...Do I recognize His voice? How do I distinguish it from all the other competing voices in my life?

A short time ago, I asked my wife this question---If she were in a large room filled with only men, and they spoke to her one at a time, would she be able to distinguish my voice from all the others? She chuckled and said *"Yes, trust me, after knowing you for 45 years, I could pick out your voice."* Her response generated gratitude in my heart, but it caused me to consider this point. The more time we spend with the Good Shepherd, the more we will recognize his voice. Getting to know His voice is something we all struggle with. Not to mention that there are many voices in the world that compete for our attention. We hear voices on social media, podcast, the daily news feed, voices and opinions of our family and friends, the voices of our culture, the voices of our own flesh, and the voices of evil. How do we distinguish the Good Shepherd's voice from all these competing voices?

God speaks to us in so many ways; in the Mass, the Sacraments, in daily life circumstances and situations, but the one place He is always speaking to us is in our conscience. This voice is always calling us to love, kindness, forgiveness and to avoid sin. We hear this voice with our heart and <u>not</u> our ears. This voice, inscribed in our heart by God, is our inner sanctuary. There we are alone with Him, and His voice echoes in the very depth of our being. But God does not compel us to follow this voice. He gives us the choice and the free will to follow whatever voice we choose, however, there are consequences for following some of the other voices Learning to recognize God's voice is a lifelong process. The more we hear it, the easier it is to recognize it. Listening, and responding to this voice helps us to develop a good moral conscience, and our obedience to it will bear witness to God's authority in our life.

For us to hear God speaking through our conscience, we need to be present to ourselves, and this requires time for daily self-reflection and self-examination. I encouraged you to take time each day to review the situations and circumstances of your life. Ask yourself, *"Where was God in my life today?" Was I present to his voice today, or am I just too busy for that?*

Unfortunately, we sometimes listen to the wrong voices and make the wrong decisions. Even with the best formed conscience, we can and will fall into sin. The Evil One will speak to us with an accusing voice. After convincing us to sin, he will then speak to us with words of condemnation. He will tell us we are worthless and trapped by our sinfulness. His words often create disunity and desolation. On the opposite hand, when we fall, the Good Shepherd will gently call us back to repentance. His is a message of forgiveness, mercy and hope. His is a soothing, calming and liberating voice.

Through a constantly growing faith life, lots of prayer and reading of the Sacred Word, we will learn to recognize the voice of the Good Shepherd. May your celebration of the Easter season continue, of the Good Shepherd who loved us so much that he laid down his life for his sheep.





2023-2024 Children's Faith Formation Recap Lauren Battcher, Director of Religious Education

Over 130 K-8 students participated in Children's Faith Formation (formerly known as "RE") during the 2023-24 school year. On Wednesday nights, these young people excitedly entered their classrooms, eager to gather with their peers and learn the Catholic faith, under the loving leadership of their catechists.

Every CFF classroom is like a 'family' with its own traditions. The kindergarten and first grade classes enthusiastically engage in hands on stations, crafts, and story-time as they discover what it means to

know and follow Jesus. The talented second grade/First Communion class can be seen acting out the Last Supper as they learn about the gift of the Eucharist, or performing a costumed Nativity Play for their parents.

Third grade implemented a "prayer tree" this year in which students spend the first portion of class-time gathered in prayer, contributing paper leaves with their prayer requests to their collaborative display of branches (see photo). In fourth grade students take turns leading their class in prayer before learning about the Ten Commandments through various media, text, and newly donated Children's Bibles!

Our 5th grade class is highly competitive and frequently engage in team games to review the truths of our Catholic tradition. The 6th grade class is known for their "word of the week" (respect, patience, accountability... just to name a few) and their Advent of Kindness challenge where they document the light they bring to the world each week.

The 7th and 8th grades are full of questions and engage in authentic conversations about what it means to follow Jesus in middle school and beyond. It's incredibly inspiring to hear these students discuss their faith journey. Fourteen 8th graders are to be Confirmed on May 23, celebrating the end of their time as a CFF student and the beginning of a lifetime of intentionally choosing to be a disciple of Jesus.

We will truly miss our CFF kids during summer break, but look forward to seeing them at events such as "Scuba" Vacation Bible School (registration is open!) and having them back in late August when CFF resumes!

On Tuesday, November 28, 2023 (**Giving Tuesday**), St. Francis Xavier participated in our first ever #iGiveCatholic day of giving. Our 2023 campaign focused on our Children's Faith Formation program which serves more than 130 children in grades K-8. The program aims to help our youth encounter God and prepare them for the sacraments through catechism, scripture, music, liturgy, prayer, and community. Through the generosity of our SFX community, we raised \$8,173! The monies raised were earmarked to make improvements in the RE building, which included new furniture and improvements in safety and technology. We are very happy to report that the following items have been purchased using iGiveCatholic funds:

- Two 65 Inch Smart TVs and 2 rolling media carts
- New foyer check-in table and chairs for the CFF
- Sofa, chair, coffee table and end table (matches the furniture in the Xavier Center)
- Two magnetic white boards for the foyer
- SFX Logo to be hung in the foyer
- Security black out curtains for classroom doors
- White boards for classrooms

The furniture placement and whiteboard hanging will be done during the CFF summer break. Stay tuned to the bulletin for details on the completion date. We hope to have an open house after a weekend Mass to show all the renovations.
