act of love may seem, it is never wasted. Every kind gesture, every moment of kindness, and every effort to care


for others is valued by God. These acts are part of a larger divine plan, showing that love has a purpose beyond what we might recognize.

In summary, Mark's Gospel reveals that acts of love, no matter their size, are important and make a difference in God's eyes. Every act of love contributes to a bigger picture of compassion and grace, reminding us that in God's eyes, nothing done out of love is ever wasted. These actions are integral to God's divine plan and underscores humanity's role as His agents. As we strive to embody this love in our daily lives, we participate in a divine work that transforms the world and echoes through all eternity.

is really important in understanding how Jesus wants us to live our lives. Mark's Gospel shows us that even small acts of kindness can have a big impact and are valuable in God's eyes. One example is found in Mark 12:41-44, where Jesus observes a poor widow who places two small coins in the temple offering. While it might seem like a tiny contribution compared to what richer people were giving, Jesus says that her offering is actually greater than theirs because she gave all she had, even though it was very little. This story teaches us that what matters most is the love and sacrifice behind our actions, not just

> how big or impressive they are. Another story is found in Mark 1:40-45, where Jesus heals a man with leprosy. This man was shunned by society because of his illness, but Jesus shows him great compassion by healing him. This act of love does more than just cure the man's disease; it restores his place in the community and it shows him that he is valuable and loved by God. Jesus' act of kindness highlights how love can change lives and bring healing, not just physically, but emotionally and socially as well.

## **Children's Church Returns**


