Fingerprine



I have now been with you here at Saint Francis Xavier since the beginning of July presiding at our Sunday celebrations. Ours is a vibrant community of praise and outreach that (as the Jesuit motto declares) "brings glory to God!" As my fingerprints begin to show on our liturgies, I want to share some of the vision that informs how I preside and why I do what I do.

The reason our Mass is the centerpiece of all we do as Catholics is that it is at Mass that our faith is born and nourished. Our faith is born from the preaching encounter and then we are nourished and strengthened with Holy Communion to bring our faith by our actions into the world. The Mass is our weekly "dance" with God.

Full and active participation of the assembly in the offering of Mass necessitates many hands volunteering as sacristans, acolytes, servers, lectors, hospitality ministers, cantors, and choir. All are orchestrated by the presider (me) to create an encounter with the Risen Lord through the collective praise of the assembled Mystical Body of Christ (you). I strive to create a simplicity of movement which amplifies the encounter. Cutting away the peripheral is like narrowing a channel of water; the result is a more powerful stream. I have come to believe over my years of presiding at Mass that "less is more." To this end you will begin to see my "fingerprints" in the various ministries of our Mass.

During the Liturgy of the Word, you will begin to see the lectors approaching the ambo from the left side of the pews. As they will not be crossing before the altar you will not see them bowing, instead they will simply walk up to the ambo and proclaim, returning to their pew after. Also, our petitions will now include the Mass intention which the presider is holding on his heart so the whole assembly can assist in this task.

The most apparent fingerprints will be found during our Offertory and Communion rites. Prepoured cups and prefilled pattens will be placed upon the altar as the servers and acolyte prepare it. Hospitality ministers will continue to gather the tithe and secure it, however only the main patten and chalice will be walked up to me when I step down from the sanctuary to receive them. This will create a smoother "flow" of our gifts to God without unnecessary waiting. Servers will more time their movements to my own to also facilitate a smoother "flow" to our prayer.

During the Communion rite our Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion will line up on the floor in front of the altar so I can bring them Communion both creating a smoother "flow" and demonstrating the movement of God's Gift of His Son from the altar to them, from them to you, and from you to the world. The sacristan will be at the altar with a replacement patten to swap out with any Extraordinary Minister before they run out of Hosts which will allow the Communion line to "flow" uninterrupted.

Finally, to enhance the "punch" of the dismissal I am sharing any community announcements just before Mass starts so that we can quickly go from receiving Holy Communion to being sent to bring our faith to our communities. (I encourage all to work at arriving at your pew at least five minutes before Mass to hear our highlights.) Our bulletin will now serve both as a worship aid for Mass and an information resource to be taken home. (This will save us the time and cost of printing separate worship aids each week.) Hopefully you may even find yourselves singing some songs throughout the week!

SFX Outreach Ministry Food Box:

A Way of Living Out
The Call To Feed The Hungry

n times of rising food prices and insecurity, community food boxes are making a quiet but powerful difference. Our outdoor pantry—located outside of our Parish Hall on the Stringer Lane side of the building —offers free, non-perishable food items to anyone in need. The slogan written

on the food box is clear and simple: "Give what you can--Take what you need". Yet behind this simplicity is a profound message of compassion, service, and real faith in action.

Our SFX Community Food Box is a modern-day response to an ancient command. Throughout Scripture, Jesus calls His followers to care for the poor and feed the hungry. In Matthew 25:35-40, Jesus speaks of the final judgment, saying, "For I was hungry and you gave

me something to eat... Truly I tell you, whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did for me." This passage reminds us that caring for the poor is not optional—it's central to Christian life and service.

Another example is found in Luke 14:13, where Jesus encourages, "But when you give a banquet, invite the poor, the crippled, the lame, the blind, and you will be blessed." These instructions reflect not only generosity but intentional inclusion and mercy. The miracle of the feeding of the 5,000 (John 6:1–14) also shows how God can multiply small offerings. One boy's lunch, shared with faith, fed thousands. Likewise, small acts of giving can ripple through a community, nourishing both body and soul.

Our food box allows us an opportunity to act on these teachings. A can of beans or a box of pasta might seem small, but to someone who hasn't eaten that day, it means everything. The food box becomes a symbol of hope, dignity, and shared humanity.

In a world filled with need, our food box invites us to be the hands and feet of Christ—offering not just food, but love, compassion, and the assurance that no one is forgotten. For over 175 years, people have come to our Church property to be fed both spiritually and physically. Let's consider being a part of that fine tradition. The next time you're at the Grocery Store, consider purchasing a few items for those in need, and drop it off in the Food Box before Mass next week.

If you judge people, you have no time to love them.

Mother Teresa's simple yet profound words challenge us to reflect on how we approach the people around us. In a world filled with division and discord, judgment can come easily through our words, thoughts, or actions. As Catholics, we are

called to something greater: love.

Jesus Himself reminds us in the Gospel of Matthew, "Stop judging, that you may not be judged" (Matthew 7:1). Judgment, when used to condemn, keeps us focused on the flaws and failures of others, preventing us from seeing them as Christ sees them. On the other hand, love opens our hearts, makes room for understanding, and seeks to build up rather than tear down.

Saint Paul speaks to this reality when he writes in Romans 14:13: "Then let us no longer judge one another but rather resolve never to put a stumbling block or hindrance in the way of a brother." This means that instead of looking for reasons to criticize, we should look for ways to support and encourage one another, bearing each other's burdens (Galatians 6:2).

In today's cultural climate—where cancel culture and polarization are widespread—Saint Teresa's words invite us to resist the temptation to judge. Social media often encourages quick opinions and harsh criticisms, but as Catholics, we are called to act differently. We are called to see the person before the flaw, to love before we criticize.



How Can We Apply This In Our Daily Lives?

Pause before responding. When we feel anger or judgment rising, take a moment to pray for the grace to see the other person through Christ's eyes.

Offer compassion, not criticism. Look for ways to love others, even when they fall short, and trust that God is working in their lives just as He is in ours.

Pray for a merciful heart. Ask the Holy Spirit to help you extend the same forgiveness and patience that Christ shows you.

Choose to love. In every interaction, choose love over judgment—whether in your family, at work, or in your community. As Jesus said, "Love one

another as I have loved you" (John 13:34).

In a world quick to judge, let us be quick to love. Let us not waste time casting stones but instead spend our energy showing mercy and sharing the love that Christ so freely gives us.

scheduled for next June!








HYSG Reflects On Fun Year

Summerfest



With this issue, we are beginning a new series




